





HARRIET PETERS RETIRES

Peters' long, productive, full-time involvement with dance at the university. After 32 years as a teacher of modern dance at Hofstra, Harriet retired from her position as **head of the** Dance program (an assignment

she assumed from its inception in 1984) and as an Associate Professor in the department

Harriet, a native of Hattiesburg, Mississippi, earned BA and MA degrees in Dance at New York University after at least seven years as a professional dancer. During this time, she performed with some of the seminal figures in the modem dance world including Mary Anthony, Daniel Nagrin and Helen Tamiris. She toured for a year as a member of the Circle Dance Company, under the direction of Drid Williams, with whom she studied extensively. She also managed to take classes with Robert Joffrey, Peter Gennaro and Pearl Primus.

Prior to the introduction of the Dance program, Harriet was a dance specialist for the Physical Education and Recreation Department at Hofstra. When the Dance program was conceived and developed by Harriet and

Associate Professor of Drama Carl Morris in 1984, she took responsibility for organizing a curriculum in dance, hiring adjunct faculty, including now Associate Professors Stormy Brandenberger and Lance Westergard and Assistant Professor Robin Becker. She recruited stu-

dents into the fledgling program and pro duced the annual Hofstra Dance Concert. In 12 years she has managed to oversee a program that now boasts at least 50 majors and 20 minors. She also brought outstanding guest artists into the department over the years including Rosalyn Newman, Blonde11 Cummings and Liza Gennaro Evans, as well as the excellent full-time dance faculty

In honor of her retirement, the Dance faculty and students dedicated the 1997 Spring Hofstra Dance Concert to her in commemoration of her dedication and foresight.

Harriet will continue to teach in an adjunct capacity during the Fall '97 semester, but the department will miss the total involvement of such 'a positive force and a fierce advocate: as Chair Peter Sander has written.


LARGE CLASS OF GRADUATES FOR '97





his year's class of 31 graduating drama and dance majors marked the highest number of students to receive BFA and BA degrees in many years. The class of '97 included three students concentrating in production, indicating a revitalization in that area of study Four students were awarded honors as a result of special research projects and creative work in the department. The graduated seniors plan a variety of activities in the coming year including travel, graduate school and freelancing in New York, the mid and far-west.

At the end of the spring semester, eight graduating BFA-Performance students and three BA graduates participated in the sixth annual Hofstra Senior Showcase. Held at the Producers Club in New York City on May 19, it was directed by Kenneth Mitchell, a New York director, and assisted by professional actress Mary McLain. The eleven students performed scenes and songs from a modern repertory before a full house. Alumni, family, classmates and approximately 13 representatives from the industry were there. At least four calls for auditions and interviews followed.

1997-1998 SEASON

Blithe Spirit by Noel Coward opens the coming Hofstra subscription season. This spirited (pun intended) farce will be directed by Peter Sander and opens at the West End Theater on October 17, playing through the 26th.

New faculty member Jean Dobie Giebel will direct Sweet *Charity*, the department's biennial large scale musical. Combining the efforts of the dance program's Stormy Brandenberger as choreographer and the Music Department's Ed Dittemore as musical director, the show was chosen to accommodate the growing number of fine dancers in the department. Sweet *Charity* will open at the John Cranford Adams Playhouse on November **6** and play through the 9th.

Royston Coppenger will provide Hofstra audiences with the rare opportunity to see a seldom done modern masterpiece. His production of August Strindberg's A *Dream Play will be* presented at the West End Theatre from November 14 to November 23.

This spring the West End Theatre show will be presented before the Shakespeare Festival The faculty has chosen A.R. Gurney Jr's nostalgic, acerbic comedy The *Middle Ages*. This production will be directed by Adjunct Professor Richard Pioreck and begins on February 20, closing March 1.

The 49th Hofstra Shakespeare Festival offers audiences a unique opportunity to see the late comedy All's well That Ends Well, never before presented at Hofstra. Peter Sander will direct utilizing the Globe Theatre reconstruction. Performances will take place from March 26 through April S.William E. Hettrick will again lead the Hofstra Collegium Musicum in a program called All's Swell. James Kolb will direct the "companion piece," a Jacobean spoof entitled The Knight of the Burning Pestle. These performances will take place on the two Saturday afternoons of the Festival.

Rounding out the season will be the annual Hofstra Faculty Dance Concert with new works by Stormy Brandenberger, Lance Westergard, Robin Becker and guest professionals. The dance concert will be presented from April 23 through April 26.

Spectrum has scheduled two shows for the year. A production of Lanford Wilson's *Burn This* is planned for the fall, and in the spring Larry Shue's farce The *Foreigner* is planned. Both shows will be at the Emily and Jerry Spiegel Theater. Masquerade Players, the extracurricular musical theatre group on campus, will also present two productions: *A Chorus Line* during the fall semester, and *Assassins* in the spring. Both shows will be performed at the Monroe Lecture Hall Theatre.

FIFTY YEARS OF SHAKESDEARE AT HOFSTRA

Plans are under way to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Hofstra Shakespeare Festival by making the 19982000 seasons *Shakespeare years* at Hofstra Spring **1999** marks the 50th anniversary of the first Shakespeare Festival production, and the year 2000 marks the inauguration of the John Cranford Adams/Bernard Beckerman/Donald H. Swinney Globe Theatre reconstruction on campus.

To commemorate the introduction of Shakespeare at Hofstra, the Department is devoting the entire season to plays by Shakespeare, his contemporaries, or adaptations of plays and musicals based on Shakespeare. Plans are being formulated for a Fall **1999** Conference on Shakespeare Production. Tentatively entitled *Staging Shakespeare at the Millennium*, the conference will be codirected by Professor Iska Alter of the English Department and Assistant Professor Royston Coppenger of the Department of Drama and Dance. A call for papers is scheduled to go out during the spring of 1998.

The featured production for the 1999 Shakespeare Festival is scheduled to be *King Lear*, never produced by the University. **The** Hofstra administration has provided additional funds to engage a noted actor to play the title role and a search is presently under way For the year 2000, *Julius Caesar*, the first Shakespeare play presented by the Festival, will be revived

Additional events such as exhibits, symposia and concerts are also being discussed. The department would welcome alumni suggestions and participation in this momentous event.

FACULTY STUDENTS AND ALUMNI JOIN IN THEATRE EXPOSITION

D.J. Markley, Director of the West End Theatre and Rychard Curtiss, Technical Director, attended the 1997 Convention and Stage Expo of the United States Institute for Theater Technology held in March in Pittsburgh.

Also attending were two students, Wendy Christensen ('99) and Leslie Segrete ('97), both Theatre Arts majors.

Several Drama alumni gave presentations and participated in panel discussions at the convention: Rick Gray ('76) Production Coordinator at Penn State University and Project Manager for Cirque d'soleil-Ballagio in Las Vegas, spoke on Automated Scenery. Norman Lazarus ('90)Technician with Walt Disney World Entertainment, participated in two panels on Production Management. Megan Ingalls ('94) presented her recent scenic design work in the Young Designer's Forum session. Also in attendance was Maureen Mooney ('92) professional stage manager

NEW FULL-TIME DEPARTMENT MEMBERS

Two full-time faculty members were hired at the end of the 19961997 academic year, one in dance and one in drama. Two new full-time staff members were also added to the production area.

Assistant Professor Robin Becker was hired on a full-time basis to fill the opening created by the retirement of Associate Professor Harriet Peters (see separate article). Robin is not a new face in the dance program. She has been teaching modern dance, ballet, and choreographing for the annual Hofstra Faculty Dance Concert as an adjunct assistant professor for eight years.

Prior to coming to Hofstra, Robin taught at Princeton Ballet Society the High School of the Performing Arts, the American Ballet Theatre, the Peridance Center, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Center and the Pasadena (CA) Dance Center. She has performed with the Eleo Pomare Dance Company, the Martha Graham Dance Company, the Gemini Dance Theatre, the Pearl Lang Dance Company and the Center Dance Collective.

For more than ten years Robin has headed her own dance troupe, *Robin Becker and Company. They* have given concerts around the country and were one of the featured groups appearing at the Joyce Theater in 1993.

Her work has been praised as 'lush and lyrical" and, in this regard, she complements the approaches of the two other full-time Dance faculty members. Robin will continue to teach modern technique and non-majors ballet. She, Stormy Brandenberger and Lance Westergard will share administrative duties for the program.



Assistant Professor Jean Dobie Giebel will become the new teacher of acting in the Drama program beginning this Fall. Jean completed her BA at Baldwin-Wallace College in Ohio in 1982, continued her graduate studies at Akron University and received her MFA in Directing from the University

of Indiana this May

Between her undergraduate and graduate studies, Jean worked extensively in New York City, studying, acting, teaching and directing at the Riverside Shakespeare Company, Playwrights Horizon, and at the Sterling Renaissance Festival. She was Associate Director of both the Riverside Shakespeare Company where she directed *King John*, and the Mint Theatre Company where she directed several plays and staged readings. She has appeared in numerous commercials and has extensive experience in industrial films and trade shows.

No stranger to production work, she has worked in costume shops at various theatres and as a survival job she was Assistant Director of Membership and Fellowship Affairs at The Council on Foreign Relations in New York. She is married to actor/theatre technician Tim Gable. They have a two and half year old daughter, Amelia.

The production area of the department has been enhanced this past year by the addition of two full-time staff members: Rychard Curtiss in the newly established position of technical director, and DeAna (Ernie) Goede as Dance and Drama costumer.



Rychard Curtiss earned his BA from Eastern Connecticut State University in 1987 where he majored in Fine Arts Humanities with minors in Theater and Radio and Television Production. He received an MFA in Theater Design and Technology from Northern Illinois University in 1996.

Rych's specialties are in Computer Assisted Design (CAD), rigging, lighting and construction. Rych has been involved in theater all his life, starting as an actor and director, and moving into technical production and design.

As an undergraduate, he produced three original scripts, one of which won Best Play in a school contest. Two years after graduation, he returned to Eastern Connecticut State as their staff Technical Director and Designer for four years.

His professional credits include TD/Designer for the Green Mountain Guild in Vermont, Rigger/Assistant Technical Director for the Opera Festival of New Jersey, TD/Designer for the Outlore Dinner Theatre in Rockland, Maine, and numerous entertainment venues in and around the Chicago area (Beach Boys, Four Tops, Salt Creek Ballet). He recently designed the lighting for the premiere of *Saturn's Children* at the HERE Theatre in SOHO, New York City

At Hofstra he designed the lighting for *Angel Street* last fall, and the Hofstra Dance Theatre during the spring semester. His teaching responsibilities for the 1996-1997 academic year included the lighting course and the lab sequence of Play Production. In addition to Rych's lighting assignments, he managed to work in some capacity on every show of the season.

DeAna Goede, known as "Ernie" after the perennial on Sesame Street, supervises all the work in the costume shop. This is a heavy burden particularly in the spring semester with the Shakespeare Festival and the Dance Concert, for which Ernie designed several pieces. She holds an Associates degree in fashion design from Chicago's International Academy of Merchandising and Design. She has worked professionally for Assistant Professor Meganne George, designing shows for the off-off-Broadway Adobe Theatre Company, at the Juilliard School, and for stock and touring companies in Indiana.

Tonia Holmes was hired as the new part-time department secretary this summer. In addition to her work with us, Tonia is completing her undergraduate degree in the School of Business. She is majoring in Finance and Banking.

YOU MUST REMEMBER THIS

Ever sat watching a quiz show at home and thought how well you would do if you only had the chance? Well, think again - it's not as easy as it looks. Knowing the answer is not the true test. I'm sure Drama major Jonathan Durante will agree with me on that. Without the 'fastest finger in the West" you can know every fact in the Encyclopedia Britannica, but unless you can "ring through" first, you will be destined to be informed, but mute, while your opponent (obviously a computer game mayen) answers the question.

Last January, Jonathan and I (along with Communications major Donna Porstner) represented Hofstra University on the MSNBC-TV quiz show, Remember This On the last day of final exams in December, while sitting at my desk, I noticed a man looking around in the Playhouse lobby I asked if he needed help and he said no, that his name was Tony Pandolfo ('71) and he was visiting the Playhouse where he had so many fond memories as a Drama alum. Of course, we talked for a while about mutual acquaintances, and then I asked him why he was on campus. He told me he was the Contestant Coordinator for Remember This and was on his way to the School of Communications to interview prospective participants. He invited Jonathan and me to join the group and after taking a written test and playing the game for a while, we were chosen to be part of the Hofs tra team.

The show, based on news items from NBC-TV's morgue over the last 4050 years, pits students, faculty, and staff from different universities against each other for scholarship money. We didn't make the cut after winning one game out of three, but since the show was broadcast across the Country, our "fifteen minutes of fame" was assured. Greg Leonard, a former backstage technical director, called me from South Carolina to say he had seen it; a business associate

of my husband's, spending the winter in Florida, sent a postcard asking if that was his wife on the quiz show; and quite a few students came back from winter recess talking about it. It was fun meeting people from other area universities and even nicer to make the acquaintance of another alum.

While he was taping in New York, Tony stayed in Sue Varon's ('75) apartment. We really have quite a network of people across the country, always willing to help one other, which is one of the many reasons to be proud of being a Hofstra drama alum.

THE WEST END THEATRE A BRIEF QUARTER C E NTU RY (REALLY!)

One cold, sunny day just before Thanksgiving in 1972, the Hofstra Drama Department obtained final clearance from the contractor working on the renovation of Calkins Hall. It was time to move into the newly created West End Theatre. An intimate theatre production program, now known as the West End Theatre, had been in operation for over two years in the east end of what had been Calkins Gymnasium (that space soon to become language labs, and since reborn as a computer center) under the temporary title of the Studio Theatre. The call from the contractor had been urgently anticipated, because for several days a demolition crew had been busy ripping down the walls of the old Studio Theatre. All of our seating equipment, lighting equipment, office furniture, etc. was standing amidst piles of rubble. We literally moved out our belongings through gaps in the wall of the building.

Our first performance took place just a few days later on December 1, 1972. In the midst of our rush to get the sound and lighting systems installed and seating established, we discovered that the front of the theatre looked identical to the rest of Calkins Hall and that no sign or marking had been provided to let the world know who or where we were. In a few minutes, salvaged from the other pressures of simultaneously moving in and opening a show, we found a piece of plywood scrap and some wooden letters left over from an old lobby **display The** only available paint was a can of red enamel and a can of gold spray paint. This 'temporary' sign became a now familiar sight on south campus.

That first production, a bill of two one act plays-Samuel Beckett's Play and Peter Handke's *Public Insult*, definitely 'moved" the audience. As part of the staging, the spectators were ushered out at intermission and a crew of students moved all 150 seats from a proscenium orientation into an arena configuration. The rest of the first season provided other novelties. The second production, The *Cage*, was mounted while its author, Italian playwright Mario Fratti, was in residence. For the last show of that first season, Gold in *the Hills*, a spoof of Victorian melodrama, we turned the West End into a saloon/music hall complete with real beer on tap, peanuts, and popcorn served to the audience by dance hall girls.

Twenty-five years later we can look back on 72 productions (over 700 public performances). Our current data base shows that there have been more than 1000 roles and major assignments available to our students.

The varied range of works has included plays by Miller, Williams, Simon, Moliere, Beckett, and even Shakespeare. We have repeated some works over the years. Waiting for Godot was first done in April 1975 with an all female cast and then again with a male cast in 1982. In 1974 the Drama department did Lillian Hellman's The Children's Hour, the Gray Wig repeated it in May 1981. Staging has varied from proscenium to thrust to arena, but though she came close with her 1991 pro-

duction of *Hekabe*, Dr. Miriam Tulin has yet to make good on her threat to do one with the audience in the middle and the actors around the periphery.

In twenty years the West End has seen all sorts of crises and calamities, including flood and drought, and has survived them all. We had floods in the basement and leaks in the roof (once onto the heads of an unsus pecting audience). The drought is remembered by the audiences which suffered through some warm spring evenings one season when our lobby water fountain refused to work. While there have been no fires, a malfunctioning fire alarm emptied the theatre during one performance!

While all the shows have left memories, a few stand out. The production of One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest had an environmental setting with a real linoleum floor, fluorescent lighting fixtures, and seating that put the audience right into the day room of a mental institution. An experimental piece, Knots, proved so popular it was kept through the following season as a touring production. The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie is remembered not only for bravura performances but also for its fluid staging. What started out as a relatively low key production became the award winning Summer of the Seventeenth Doll, which went on to performances at Penn State University and at the Kennedy Center as part of the American College Theatre Festival.

Although the scale of the West End is smaller than the Playhouse, the size of settings has to be roughly similar. To provide room for the necessary number of actors, and even a severely limited amount of scenery, for any given play requires an irreducible minimum of space. In twenty years we have learned many tricks of legerdemain to enable us to fit everything in a room only 40 feet by 60 feet and still leave room for an audience. We have had many realistic interiors with many of them calling for a staircase to a second floor. While not a problem in most theatres, the ten foot height of the ceiling makes a stairway an interesting problem in design, directing, engineering, and backstage logistics.

The Off-off-Broadway and Dinner Theatres where many of our students get their start share many of the same limitations found in the West EndTheatre. Training in this facility has given them experience in designing, staging and generally coping with an unusual space.

We would like to thank all who have participated and contributed in the work over the past quarter century, especially the directors who have overcome the challenges of working in such a non traditional space. From our faculty: Royston Coppenger, Phylis Fox Ravel, Carol Kastendieck, James Kolb, Richard Kramer, Richard Mason, Peter Sander, Carol Sica, Miriam Tulin, James Van Wart, and Barbara Waldinger. Guest Directors include: Ted Cornell, April Shawhan, Clay Fullum, Kenneth Mitchell, Susan Schulman (alumna), Rob Weiner (alumnus), and Charles Repole (alumnus).

SPOTLIGHT ON PHILIP ROSENTHAL THE ROAD TO RAYMOND

y does Everybody Love Raymond? Because the very talented and funny Hofstra drama alum, Philip Rosenthal ('81), conceived, created and writes the current hit TV sitcom. The "Road from Hofstra to Raymond" is full of many interesting (and sometimes funny) events.

According to Phil, he began life after graduation as a 'struggling actor in NewYork." He performed in plays at Columbia University for a grad student/playwright who needed actors. Phil was glad to accommodate him. Some time later, he and the playwright collaborated on a "spec" script for the TV show, Roseanne. The script was based on an actual experience in Phil's life. While working as a security guard at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in Manhattan, he was also cast in his first play, which is 'what everybody dreams about." However, rehearsals took place during the day and later on dress rehearsals were scheduled in the evening, so the only time he wasn't rehearsing was the same time he was working at the Met -12 midnight to 8 AM. He literally had no time for sleep but thought "since I was 21 years old I could handle it." After the third night of dress rehearsals, with a terrible cold, he was "a walking zombie." He had finished his assigned route early and remembers looking over at a 300 year old bed in the American Wing. The next thing he knew his supervisor was shaking him, and he woke up thinking "how did she get in my room?" He got fired but was successful in throwing himself on the mercy of the head of security and was reinstated.

Writing that script succeeded in getting him representation at the William Morris Agency. After that, the first job he and his partner got was writing for the Robert Mitchum sitcom *A Family for Joe*, which he says was not a huge success. However, he

feels that, be it good or bad, your first show is still a great learning experience. He also wrote **for** TV sitcoms *Baby Talk, The Ray Sharkey Show, Down the Shore* and Coach (for 3 years).

Once writers reach a certain level, comedians and agents seek them out to create shows. This is how Phil was approached for Everybody Loves Raymond. He was sent a tape of Ray Romano, liked it and then met personally with the comedian. The last step was to meet David Letterman, since the talk show host's company would be producing the show. When Phil went to his office he was somewhat surprised when Letterman motioned him to sit behind the desk. Letterman and two other producers sat opposite, in the visitors chairs. Phil thought "maybe it's a test to see if I have what it takes to sit behind a desk" - and it was. They treated him as if he already had the job, but later he realized that was the interview.

Phil is married to Monica Horan ('84). He didn't know her at Hofstra, since she transferred in after he had graduated, but they met through mutual friends. He was at a show in New York with other Hofstra alums and Monica was performing in it. He remembers being impressed with her acting and comedic ability. Later on, he,Tom McGowan ('81) and Sue Varon ('75) were cast in a play at Columbia, directed by Rob Weiner ('80). They needed another actress

and Phil thought of Monica and recommended her. They started dating and were married in 1990. They have a 3 year old son, Ben, and Lily Rebecca was born on August 2.

When asked to reminisce about his Hofstra days, Phil said he remembers 'how much fun we had, Tom McGowan, Richard Stegman, Rob Weiner, Moira Wilson and myself.' He loved being in Twelfth Night and especially The Venetian Twins because I got to play a villain. I absolutely loved Mrs. Tulin because she was so sweet and encouraging." He still keeps in touch with Dr. Mason, "even though he tortured me at Hofstra ('you ruined my second act' Macbeth '81)." Phil said he has only great memories of the theatre department.? learned so much at Hofstra about how shows and rehearsals should be run - things I'm still using to make the Raymond show today."

When asked if he had any words of wisdom for current students and new grads, Phil said: "Be interested in all aspects of the business because you never know where the break is going to come from. I thought I was only going to be an actor, but my break came with writing. Who's to say I won't get around to acting again. I'm still learning. Knowing what I know now about acting from this end of the business, if I ever return to acting, I'll be unstoppable!"

Zuefle, **Dagmar** ('93) – **pursuing** Master's Degree in English at **Ford**ham University and also planning to continue acting and directing.






