

A Message From the Co-Directors

This year marks the 30th anniversary of the publication of the final volumes of Foucault's landmark *History of Sexuality*; on June 25 of that same year, Foucault died from complications related to AIDS. Now is therefore the perfect moment to discuss and debate where Foucault's thought is leading us today and might lead us tomorrow. At a time when our society is experiencing fundamental changes, our understanding of Foucault's legacy is also being drastically reconsidered due to the publication of previously unreleased lectures. In these lectures Foucault revises key concepts in his theoretical apparatus as he senses the beginnings of the shifts in culture, politics, and technology that we are experiencing today. It goes without

saying that Foucault's thought has profoundly reshaped the humanities and social sciences over the last half century. *Foucault 2014: Beyond Sexuality* will explore how Foucault's legacy continues to inform important new work in ethics, feminism, queer studies, Greek and Roman antiquity, medicine, psychoanalysis, art, and literature – all in hope of using Foucault's thought to shape our future.

BY CAR: Travel on the Long Island Expressway to exit 38, Northern State Parkway, to Meadowbrook Parkway South (exit

31A), or Southern State Parkway to Meadowbrook Parkway North (exit 22N). Take Meadowbrook Parkway to exit M4 (Hempstead Turnpike). Proceed west on Hempstead Turnpike (Route 24W) to the Hofstra campus (approximately one mile).


